We hope that as we move into what is usually the busiest times of year that you remember to look after yourselves and your practice staff. We cannot stress enough the importance of supporting each other's health and wellbeing under the current pressures of working in Primary Care. We continue to raise this as a priority to the ICB as your Black Country Primary Care Collaborative representatives.

You will all no doubt be feeling a little anxious about the increasing cases of measles across the Black Country and we would urge you to continue to follow local and National advice as it is communicated. We have re-iterated the need for assistance in general practice to enable us to comply with the NHS England and HPA guidelines. It is also important that we learn the lessons from COVID and ensure that all of us are implementing robust virtual (telephone and video) triage. We need to balance this we some reassurance in the knowledge that 80-90% of the population, even the under 12's have had at least 1 MMR vaccination which will offer significant protection.
